



 - Progress reports and deliverables









Figure 8: Countries covered by VCs with scope both regional and national/local




Figure 6: VCs by geographic scope

Figure 7: Regions covered by VCs with regional scope





NGOs represent almost 60 percent of all implementers and 29 percent of other partners

- 82 organizations are involved in VCs
 - 51 as implementers (62 percent)
 - 31 as other partners (38 percent)
- 46 percent of VCs are implemented by more than one organization
 - This figure was less than 5 percent in 2015


Figure 16: VC implementers by type of organization


Figure 24: Sendai Priorities for Action covered by VCs





Figure 30: Word cloud for hazards covered by VCs




Figure 34: SDGs covered by VCs



FOR DISASTER RISK REDUCTION 2015-2030







- Disasters can rollback development gains
- Some weather events appear more frequent, intense and with longer durations
- From 2000 to 2018, on average every year:
 - 200 million people affected
 - 70,000 lives lost
- USD520 billion a year in costs to the global economy
- Natural hazards affect low-andmiddle income countries more severely in terms of loss of lives, homes and livelihoods
