The "San-San Shopping Arcade" opened on February 25th 2012 as a temporary shopping arcade based on the concept of "making the shopping arcade in Minamisanriku full of smiles and energy, just like the sun shining brightly". Five years have passed since the disaster, and the permanent shopping arcade has now opened on March 3rd 2017 (San-San).

The permanent version of the shopping arcade opened in the Shizugawa district, where the ground has been raised by 8.3 meters since the earthquake and where National Routes 45 and 398 intersect.

It is made up of 6 single-story buildings made from Minami Sanriku cedar, 6 restaurants, 5 shops related to daily life, 4 souvenir shops, 3 fresh fish shops, 6 cafes and sweets shops, 2 beauty salons, 1 funeral-related shop, 1 convenience store, 1 direct-from-the-farm facility, and a total of 29 shops.

The Great East Japan Earthquake, a magnitude 9.0 earthquake that occurred at 2:46 pm on March 11th 2011, triggered a devastating tsunami that caused over 800 deaths and left many others missing in Minamisanriku. The Minamisanriku Town Earthquake Reconstruction Memorial Park is a place for mourning and remembering those who lost their lives in the Great East Japan Earthquake, as well as a place for passing on the memory of the immense damage and the lessons learned, and praying for the recovery from the disaster.

It was built in 1995 (Heisei 7) as one of the administrative buildings of the town hall of Shizugawa Town. In contrast to the 2.4 meter^[1] depth of flooding caused by the Chilean earthquake in Shizugawa Town, the Disaster Prevention Measures Office Building was a steel-framed three-story building located 1.7 meters above sea level, about 600 meters from the coast, and had an evacuation area on the roof, which was about 12 meters above ground level. On October 1, 2005 (Heisei 17), Shizugawa Town and Utatsu Town merged to form Minamisanriku Town. The Disaster Prevention Office Building became one of the administrative buildings of Minamisanriku Town Hall. The main office of the town hall was built with the first and second administrative buildings and the Disaster Prevention Office Building next to each other.

On March 11th, 2011 (Heisei 23), the Tohoku Pacific Offshore Earthquake (Great East Japan Earthquake) triggered a 15.5 meter tsunami that swept away the first and second government buildings, leaving only the framework and the floors and roofs of each floor of the disaster prevention building. Due to this tragedy (described below), the disaster prevention building is considered a disaster remnant.
